Dear Colleague,

Before leaving for Brasil I received your letter dated 16 August 1978, relating to the publication of a series of Papers on "Early Man in America" by A.L.Bryan. Sure I remember the meeting from december 1976 in your office at the Museu Nacional in Rio together with you and Mr. x Mrs. Bryan. So you may understand that I am at present very surprised about the evolution of this affair.

As you have requested I will inform Prof. De Lumley who is the President of the INQUA Commission on the "Paleo-ecology of Early Man" as well as Professor Bordes who wrote the "Preface" and who is as you know very competent in these matters.

With regard to the scientific aspect of the Alice Boer site I am astonished to find in the publication made by Prof. Bryan only one reference with regard to your publications even when they are numerous, and only the photographs of three non-representative pieces of artefacts of the collection found in Bed V of the site. Since you deny any -authorship, I assume it was Prof. Bryan who made However, as I had the occasion to look at selection. Alice Boer industries many times, I quite agree with your statements that: first, there is an important mixture industries; second, that two types are preponderant: the moustérian with typical levallois flaking and a great number of end - and side - scrapers and a much older, "chellean" industry with chopping tools and bi-faces. Again I with your claim that both industries have been transported by water but then, considering the highly worn aspect of the older artefacts and the almost fresh aspects of the younger ones, I would advocate that deposition took place at about the period of manufacturing of the younger material. In European terms, this would mean somewhere between 35.000 and 150.000 BP. Taking your datation of Bed III into account I would think of an age of about 50.000 BP.

Nevertheless, considering the chellean affinity of the chopping tools, occurring together with a younger industry, I would like to believe that Early Man had chosen the Rio Claro valley as a dwelling place already since the middle of the Mid - Pleistocene.

As you know I am working on the Mid-Pleistocene deposits of the Rio Doce in Minas Gerais which perfectly fit with the succession in the Rio Claro area as well as around the Itaborai site.

The findings of Alice Boer and Itaborai are therefore most important for Archaeologists and Geologists since they seriously render the age of arrival of mankind and related deposits much older. As we discussed many times, this may change totally the concept of the usage of the Bhering Strait and its importance for South America.

I dare hope you may rectify this view on the presence of Mankind in South America quickly as I would like also suggest you compare the industries of Alice Boer and Itaborai with the collections of French Prehistory.

Finally, I would like to ask you to keep me informed. With best regards.
